Schools of Hope after-school program at Southwest Community Campus joined Homework House™ as UCOM partnered with United Way, Believe2Become and GRPS to help 1-3rd graders close the reading achievement gap. Homework House™ tutors worked with 4-8th graders on literacy with an emphasis on social studies.

3 mission groups in 2010 gained experience by living and working for a week each with UCOM staff, clients and volunteers. Teens and adults commented that the hard work and getting to know some people who cope with poverty issues each day, had forever changed their thinking about poverty.



UCOM provided groceries for 1/2 million meals in 2010 in Wyoming, Grandville and Southwest Grand Rapids.

UCOM partners with Spectrum Health to provide the NOW Pantry. 40 clients get weekly food specifically to help them manage chronic illnesses like heart disease, diabetes and high blood pressure.
